## Lookout for harmful plants and animals

Working and playing in the great outdoors can give you a feeling of being one with nature, but nature can bite if you are not careful. Wasps, snakes, spiders and other unwelcome guests are found not only outdoors but can be lurking in confined spaces. Poisonous plants may be a problem, too.

Some of the harmful plants and animals you may find at home or at work may include: poison ivy, poison oak, poison sumac, ragweed, tick, poisonous spiders (black widow and brown recluse), bees, hornets, wasps, mosquitoes, fire ants, dogs and cats, foxes, skunks, raccoons, squirrels, and bats.

Knowing how to steer clear of these harmful plants and animals is the first step in avoiding injury. However, you should also know how to treat injuries that may occur. Here are some general methods of treatment:

**Poisonous plants** – Wash all exposed areas with coldrunning water. The water will neutralize the toxic oil and keep it from spreading. Do not use soap; it may spread the oil. If you develop a rash, avoid scratching the blisters. Fingernails may carry germs and cause infection.

Wash all clothing outside before bringing it into your house or work facility. Handle it as little as possible until it is soaked. Wash all gear that may also be carrying the oil.

**Animal scratch or bite** – Clean wound with soap and water to prevent infection. Cover with a clean bandage. Seek medical attention; animals often carry diseases like rabies.

**Insect bite or sting** – Remove the stinger by scraping it. You can use tweezers, but squeezing the stinger releases more venom. Apply hydrocortisone cream or calamine lotion. Apply cold water or ice for pain.

Always seek medical attention if the wound becomes infected or does not improve, other symptoms like headache or fever develop, or poisonous plants and animals are involved.
